


## Sport online issues...

- Negative impact on team dynamics comments on performance or selection
- Clothing can be misinterpreted
- Organisational reputational risk v personal risk
- Online banter and bullying
- Parental behaviour

# A young person asks you to be friends with them on social media.

- contact outside of club (blurring boundaries and being responsible 24/7)
- dub policies
- adult/child relationships and boundaries
- offending the child if they ask
- see inappropriate behaviour in adults/ or young people
- friends of friends

- clear purpose and objective to using social media
- Asking, 'Do we really need it?' as a part of organisations plan
- professional profiles
- clear codes of behaviour (as in offline activities)
- ways of reporting, responding to incidents, at least two people moderating
- risk assessing use of social media
- communication should be appropriate to club activities


There's been a change of venue and you need to send a text to let people know.





- appropriate ways of communicating
- one on one contact with children
- mis-understanding communication
- personal details (phone number) given out
- mis use of phone

- group/dub phone?
- parents included in comms or aware of processes
- group texts
- moderated/accessed by more than one person
- awareness of time of day, appropriateness etc
- make sure records are kept



Parents have been taking pictures at an event and posting them on them on Facebook.



- body image/ consent of other young people
- vulnerable young people
- appropriate?
- how do you control in a public place?
- consent of young people and others

- codes of behaviour, communicated with parents
- importance of respect and consent from young people
- generic consent forms
- club policies and practices, agreed with young people and parents
- encourage official photography and places to share this publicly
- education for young people about sharing online and agreement to respect each others wishes.

A young person tells you that another member is bullying them via instant messaging





- welfare of the person being bullied/ and the bully
- potential illegal activity
- effect on rest of the team
- managing emotions

- anti bullying codes/ behaviour
- education with young people what to do, how to report
- clear reporting lines
- talking with young people about what they want to do (empowering them)
- deal with the issues/take it seriously

- Find out more about the media
- Consider safeguarding from the outset
- Risk assess and plan
- Integrate online into your existing safeguarding policies and procedures
- Communicate this clearly
- Safe recruitment and selection for those managing your social media
- Clear reporting lines for concerns
